ver the past 18 months the ministry staff and Church Council have been discussing our pathway forward as a church. We are excited to announce that beginning Easter Sunday, April 12, we will begin celebrating with two Sunday worship services here at THE LIFE.

In some ways this is a dream come true. As a fairly new church, it was not too long ago that I would anxiously wait on Sunday mornings to see if anyone was going to come to church. The number of people and families who now worship with us on a weekly basis is truly inspiring. Our attendance for the month of January was up 46% over last January. This is extremely exciting and, yet, also creates wonderful challenges.

I have heard from some people that the church these days is too crowded, difficult to find seats, and difficult to get in and out of--especially after church. Someone recently said that a new family said they "loved the church when they visited, but it the posted time—no more late starts. was a zoo."

I want to thank the Deacons, Vicars, Musicians, Worship Assistants, Altar Guild, and all involved in making these shifts to accommodate our growing Church. This is a great "problem" to have.

We know that growth can bring new challenges, but our focus will always remain centered on the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We truly believe that the additional worship service will serve us all better. We are not afraid to reevaluate this decision after a period of time and adjust accordingly.

A Growing Opportunity

ith the emergence of Spring many of us anticipate the abundance of vegetables we will harvest from our gardens in the coming months. From the early tender greens of lettuce and kale, to the sweet peas and string beans, and then the spicy radishes, garlic and scallions, until finally the cucumbers, squash and tomatoes are ready to eat, we know the fruits of our labor will be satisfying. Even if the carrots are stubby, the celery short, and the tomatoes are splotchy, the flavor will be remarkable. This is the reward for growing your own organic vegetables.

Dating back to when THE LIFE was just a seed at this beautiful location in Old Westbury, members shared their Godgiven talents to work the land and produce food for a growing congregation. We are blessed to have the property available to plant a garden here and grateful for the volunteers willing to pitch in to plant and reap the harvest for all to enjoy.

As we plan for this year's garden, we look upon the failures and successes to guide us on our way. With the introduction of new varieties of plants to grow each year, the list of vegetables is overwhelming. The opportunity to grow produce not available in the local markets has been our focus for the past few seasons.

Last year we grew four varieties of kale, three varieties of string beans, two varieties of soybeans, three varieties of egg-

plant, six varieties of peppers, three varieties of squash, two varieties of cucumber, one variety of watermelon, and fifteen varieties of tomatoes. We even had room for some basil, parsley, rhubarb, celery, onions, garlic and lovage.

The abundance of harvest was great. Last year was a learning experience, and this season will be no different. The goal is the same, but the plant selection Bountiful harvest from 2019 will change.

Before we can do any planting, some preparation is needed. Due to the construction of the parking lot, the garden area needs to be relocated slightly to allow for improvements and easy maintenance of the parsonage grounds. This will require the removal of the wire fence and gates, as well as the removal of some existing lawn areas to create a new planting space away from the new white picket fence. The irrigation sys-

tem can then easily be revised and installed as needed. Once we do a bit of weeding and add some organic fertilizer to the soil, we'll be ready to plant.

Many hands make light work. So, whether you are curious or ambitious, please plan to join us on Saturday, April 18, at 10 a.m. for Green Thumb Day.
